1. Call to order and roll call.

MEMBERS PRESENT: Jim Wickham, Chair (Mill Valley), Kathrin Sears (Marin County), Claire McAuliffe (Belvedere; David Kulik (Tiburon)

STAFF: Curtis Havel, Harbormaster

### 2. Consent Agenda.

- a) Approve minutes of September 10, 2020.
- b) Approve Resolution No. 08-20 accepting \$46,634 from the State of California Division of Boating & Waterways Boating Safety and Enforcement Equipment Grant Program. M/S, McAuliffe/Sears, to approve the Consent Agenda. Motion passed unanimously.
- 3. Information Item: Presentation on Community Efforts. There were no updates.
- 4. Presentation of the stakeholder engagement plan for the Richardson's Bay Eelgrass Protection and Management Plan by Rebecca Schwartz-Lesberg, Coastal Policy Solutions.

Harbormaster Havel introduced Rebecca Schwartz-Lesberg of Coastal Policy Solutions, who is leading the drafting of eelgrass management planning for Richardson's Bay. Ms, Schwartz-Lesberg made a presentation about the scope of work that reflected the direction in RBRA's Transition Plan, the engagement of stakeholders, and drafting of potential measures to protect and preserve eelgrass, which will be presented at an upcoming meeting for public comment and Board direction.

The following persons who identified as follows commented on the item: Robbie Powelson, Jeff Jacobs, Doug Storms, Anon, Barbara Salzman, Eva Persante, Denise Dresser, Melanie, Ann Libbin, and Elias.

Comments summary: Concerns about boats being taken by Curtis; stakeholder engagement shouldn't be tokenized; environmentalism by violence is not balanced; very important to do deep work; there are stories of violence and boat taking by the harbormaster; 100 people have refused to enroll with RBRA; objected to criminal activity being grounds for removal from anchorage; the harbormaster does not have the right to say who stays and who goes; impressed with Ms. Schwartz-Lesberg's credentials; there hasn't been enough time to discuss the issues; many people live with eelgrass on a daily cycle; as said in the Merkel study, community input is critical; encouraged working with the mariners; want to see scientific evidence of eelgrass

destruction by boats and metrics on the decline of bird and fish population; how much damage is from municipal sewage; hope Rebecca is sincere about going out on the bay; people on the bay pay taxes and come from all over the world for the nostalgic history of Richardson's Bay; look forward to participating in discussion about the eelgrass; support BCDC's position that anchorouts should be gone in five years; want the reports from the eelgrass planning work to be available to the public; hope everyone will recognize how important the mariners will be in this work and hope to maintain more awareness from environmental organizations like the Audubon Society; hypocritical to live in a \$2 million house and expect anchorouts to leave; long history of using environmentalism against poor people and hope environmental community can reassess their position; if Audubon is so set on removing anchorouts, need to carve out housing for them; what consideration will be given to the role of eelgrass in carbon sequestration particularly with respect to climate and fire; RBRA must and shall submit to constitutional law; RBRA encroaches upon civil rights, must stop tyranny of posting during shelter in place ordinances; inhabitants do not believe these demands are illegal or inappropriate; how will there be input from sailors not permanently anchored on the bay but who in the future might be interested in the transit use that's permitted under the RBRA rules; concerned about lack of an equity lens in the presentation; people are having their humanity questioned, being put out of their homes out of something that's easily resolved, not hearing about eelgrass friendly moorings, not hearing about Audubon using their resources to celebrate the lives of people who live in harmony with nature, see people in tears because their houses are being destroyed, can't reconcile that with saving a few acres of eelgrass; there's children and mothers out there, people taking care of other folks, if you take their boats away they will be homeless.

Ms. Schwartz-Lesberg addressed issues and questions raised including concerns about tokenization, providing reports about eelgrass damage, will look at alternative anchoring and mooring techniques to minimize damage, sewage spills are a problem and when they are identified legal action is taken; everything produced in the study will be available; not going to be doing an evaluation on climate sequestration in the bay but there are other studies that address that question in general; open to capture info from sailors; and that some of the other issues raised pertained to other aspects of RBRA.

Chair Wickham said that intimidation of RBRA staff was not acceptable and will not deter the agency from its path. The harbormaster is doing his job to carry out the Board's enforcement priorities. If the public takes issue with actions, the way to express opposition or concern is at the Board meetings or by writing to the Board, and that he supported the work the harbormaster is doing.

### 5. Open time for public expression.

Douglas Storms: Made great progress with coffees, been difficult time for communication during pandemic, spoke with Board last month, there is legal action being taken by mariners because they feel their rights are being violated, three legal actions. There's no public place to meet, to charge up your phone, so during this time that enforcement is being taken, the very population that's being targeted have their hands tied behind their backs, there has been no budging in discussions with Curtis; prioritizing boats for loss of life should be the priority.

Jeff Jacobs: Forces are paying salaries in a concerted effort to intimidate a community formed long before you were born; you promised not to target boats during pandemic; Hailey's boat taken; fighting with lawsuits. That you are well-funded and being paid, the carbon you generate, to use environmentalism against poor people – you should be ashamed; using environmentalism and eelgrass to destroy a community; don't just be concerned about money.

Robbie Powelson: RBRA is manipulating the Harbors & Navigation code to do this campaign; doesn't RBRA's code say ten days are needed, boat was destroyed immediately; there are specific issues that define marine debris; willing to continue this fight because RBRA is breaking the law; when he took Hailey's boat he broke a promise.

Brian Doris: David Bone died and his wife was living on the boat and 48 hours later it was crushed.

Rebekah, Fairfax resident: Equity is part of sustainability; people were driven out of other places. Conditions of our country make so many people homeless; these people are being punished, it's not their fault. Unfathomable, what is the rush and also what is the concern about eelgrass during COVID. Embarrassed about this happening, what about as we get further and further burned out, don't understand why I'm hearing stories of cruelty.

Melanie M: This legacy community is special and should be preserved; know there is addiction, trauma; been here since March, am a nonviolent pacifist. There are certain things that should happen for us to become a legacy community. We registered with the census. This is the last hippie independent community that's around anymore, we would be a great tourist attraction.

Eva: Crushing fiberglass boats is bad for air quality; if boats are crushed, people will be at greater risk of getting COVID. Tried to impress upon Curtis without permanent affordable housing, anchorouts are vulnerable. The last thing we want to do is take people out of the one place they can self-isolate. Asked Marin Audubon to look at their position.

Elias: Appreciation to anchorouts who spoke to the community under such dire circumstances. Appalled by the support for destroying peoples' houses. Heartbroken to see an organization that could be working for good be such a negative force in our community. This will have huge effects; what about the young children who will learn about this and not feel comfortable working with nature organizations because of their relationship with poor people; forced migration perpetuated by environmentalism; John Audubon was a white supremacist and slaveholder, they have a history of engaging in bad behavior, don't need to be supporting the eviction of people from their houses; they recently had a meeting on intersectionality, which is hypocrisy when homes are being taken during a pandemic.

Denise Dresser: Asked if there police reports taken about violence.

Barbara Salzman: Remind folks that we've been involved in this issue, waiting to have the bay better protected and cleared since the Richardson's Bay Special Area Plan was adopted; as of a couple of years ago, was the first one to urge the Board to get some social welfare help for people on the bay. Some people are in need of help, and some do not need to live there; we fully support all the things you are doing to move people off the water, it's not a safe place to live. Our

goals and purposes are environmental and we understand help is needed for the people who live out there,

### STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Approve Resolution No. 09-20 approving acceptance of \$400,000 from the SAVE 2020 grant program.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The RBRA applied for and is eligible for \$400,000 in funding from the California Division of Boating and Waterways for use in the Surrendered and Abandoned Vessel Exchange (SAVE) 2020 Program for use through September 2022. Resolution 09-20 is the formal acceptance of these funds.

### **DISCUSSION:**

The SAVE funding process has been employed successfully over the years by RBRA and is expected to proceed as in years past. RBRA has been able to meet the 10% matching fund requirement through in-kind contributions and has always spent down its allotted funding within the timeframes set by the State.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPACT:**

The \$400,000 funding this year is \$150,000 - or 60% - more than last year's allocation of \$250,000 and exceeds the \$250,000 programmed in the 2020-21 budget. A resolution amending the budget accordingly will be placed on an upcoming Board agenda.

### **NEXT STEPS:**

Upon Board approval, staff will finalize the steps to receive the funds and utilize them for their intended purposes.

**Subject:** Fiscal year 2020-21 Budget Amendment Resolutions accepting additional funds and authorizing an associated increase in revenue and expense appropriations

#### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION:**

- 1. Approve Resolution No. 10-20 accepting from the State Department of Parks and Recreation, Division of Boating and Waterways additional SAVE 20 grant award funds of \$150,000 to be used for RBRA's surrendered and abandoned vessel exchange program (SAVE); and authorizing in fiscal year 2020-21 an associated increase in revenue and expense appropriations of the \$150,000 from the grant.
- 2. Approve Resolution No. 11-20 accepting \$15,000 from the County of Marin towards contract services with Coastal Policy Solutions for development of eelgrass restoration and protection initiatives and preparation of grant applications, and authorizing in fiscal year 2020-21 an associated increase in revenue and expense appropriations of the \$15,000 from the County.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

### Resolution No. 10-20

The State Department of Parks and Recreation, Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW), annually allocates funds to agencies to assist in the removal of vessels that have been surrendered by their owners or otherwise marine debris or abandoned, in what is called the Surrendered and Abandoned Vessel Exchange Program (SAVE).

Staff has been notified that RBRA will receive \$400,000 in SAVE 20 funds, which is \$150,000 more than RBRA had programmed in its adopted fiscal year 2020-21 budget. The Resolution now before the Board authorizes an increase of \$150,000 in revenue and expense appropriation in the fiscal year 2020-21 budget to reflect the full amount of the SAVE 20 grant award.

#### Resolution No. 11-20

The Transition Plan adopted by the Board on June 11, 2020 provided direction to develop eelgrass restoration and protection initiatives to improve bay habitat, and to seek funding to support such efforts. RBRA retained the services of Coastal Policy

Solutions to launch the development of protection and restoration initiatives and to seek grant funding. The scope of services includes drafting the proposed creation of designated areas within Richardson's Bay that delineate allowable uses, eelgrass protection measures, and other requirements or approaches; this work includes facilitating discussions with stakeholders and presenting those findings, and subsequently drafting, presenting, and finalizing an eelgrass protection and management plan. The services also include preparing applications for three grant programs.

The County of Marin offered a \$15,000 contribution to help RBRA to launch the eelgrass and grant application work. Resolution No. 10-20 authorizes accepting the contribution and amending RBRA's 2020-21 budget to reflect the contribution revenue and expense. Funding for the remaining \$15,000 cost is available in the 2020-21 RBRA budget in program savings.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Approval of the resolutions allows RBRA to accept and expend additional revenue consistent with its mission and Transition Plan.







- Eelgrass Protection and Management Plan
- Marine spatial planning to ID locations for allowable uses (e.g., 72-hour and 30-day anchoring, recreational boating, kayaking)


### Summary of Feedback – Missing Voices

### Summary of Feedback by Theme (1 of 4)

### Threats to Richardson's Bay to consider during EPMP development:

- Sea level rise and other impacts of climate change
- Public safety
- Damage from anchors, chains, and other ground tackle
- Marine debris
- Stormwater runoff/water quality
- Loss of maritime culture (not just liveaboards), including herring/fishing culture

- Shading and other impacts from docks
- Regulatory burdens on marina operators
- Natural fluctuation in eelgrass determining static boundaries
- Lack of awareness about importance of eelgrass to communities

### Summary of Feedback by Theme (2 of 4)

### <u>Uses to consider during EPMP</u> <u>development:</u>

- Richardson's Bay is an anchorage
- Recreation, especially non-motorized
- RB as a sailing destination for cruisers/visiting vessels
- Education
- Marinas
- Science/research

- Eelgrass restoration and bed migration with sea level rise
- Birds and wildlife
- Beneficial reuse of sediment/dredge material
- Opportunities for deeper water off Belvedere/Tiburon

### Summary of Feedback by Theme (3 of 4)

### **Additional Feedback (General):**

- Vessel enforcement will be key to success
- Partnerships important
- Should include monitoring on ecological scale (10 years+)
- Don't make marina operation harder



### Summary of Feedback by Theme (4 of 4)

### **Additional Feedback (Major):**

- Keep zones as simple as possible (anchoring/no anchoring, no specific area for legacy boats)
- Mooring program
  - Safer, better for eelgrass
  - Should be considered now rather than a separate planning process down the line
  - Visitor-serving, revenue generating

- Need for spatial analysis, not just spatial planning
  - Current effort is high-level
  - Interest from stakeholders for quantitative rather than qualitative analysis
  - Inclusion of additional data layers beyond eelgrass and depth (e.g., herring spawning, vessel use)
  - Alternatives analysis
