Hi, Steve.

I have a couple of observations and questions about the proposed morning field and its management.

- 1. The public dock indicated on the chart is, I believe, the one at Galilee Harbor which was removed. Will that one be put back in place? The only public dock currently available is the one at the foot of Turney Street between Salito's and the Joinery.
- 2. All motor driven tenders used to get people to and from their boats at anchor and that are not registered with the DMV are required to have "T/T" (Tender To) followed by the boat name on them so that they are identifiable. Most currently are not marked at all, making them unidentifiable for any reporting of speed limit or other infractions or contacts. It's the same as driving your car without a license plate. Will they be required to either register or T/T their motor driven dinghies and runabouts?
- 3. Many people currently anchored out do not follow speed laws. This sometimes causes things to fall and break in the galleys on boats in the marinas or flushes the resting harbor seals off their resting places in violation of the Marine Mammal Protection Act. Could the laws regarding tender markings and speed limits be posted and enforced? The speed limit inside the channel and from there to the shore is 5mph. There used to be buoys marking the speed limit, but they are not there anymore.
- 4. My understanding is that this mooring field is temporary and will be removed after 2026 (?) when the anchor out community is supposed to be disbanded. Is this still the plan?
- 5. Will some of the moorings be available for transients or will they all be for live-aboard anchor out vessels?
- 6. Who will be responsible for maintaining the moorings and for ensuring that the vessels are insured and registered? Who will be responsible for damages caused if they break loose during a storm?



I am the interim Executive Director of the Richardson Bay Regional Agency, RBRA, and want to let you know about just one of the many things happening at the RBRA these days.

In August of 2021, RBRA and BCDC executed an agreement. As a part of this agreement, RBRA will be developing a mooring field of 15-20 moorings, for the relocation of vessels out of the eelgrass area. Per the agreement, this mooring area must be in the anchorage zone, and out of the eelgrass protection zone. This constrains somewhat where the moorings can go.


Area available for moorings:




Three options will be considered by the RBRA Board of Directors at the meeting on Thursday, April 14 at 5:30.

Those options currently look like this:


